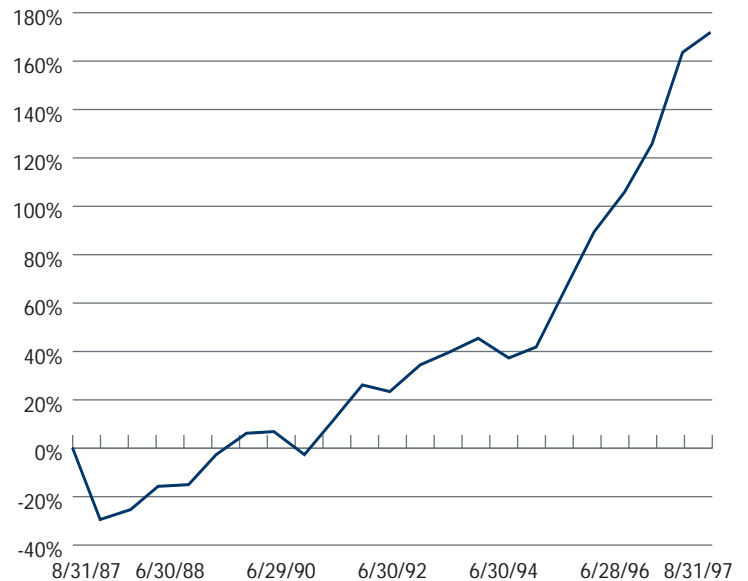

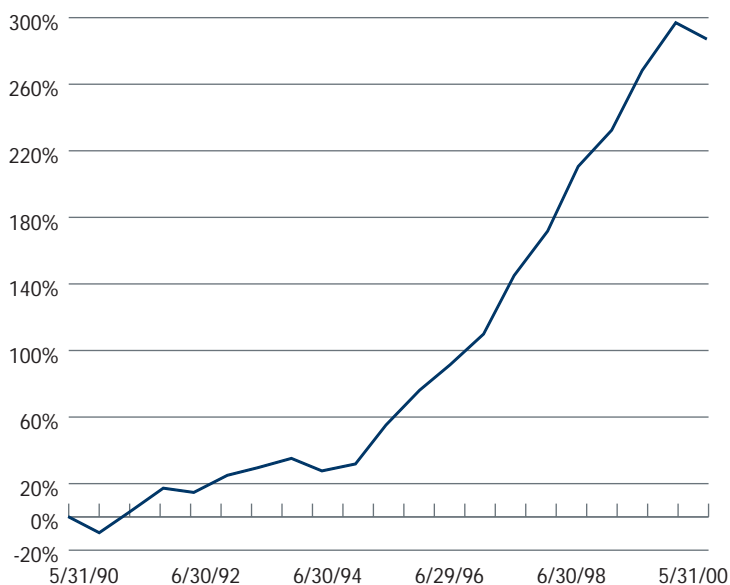
1987 Crash*

Annualized price return of 10.51% from 8/31/87 – 8/31/97



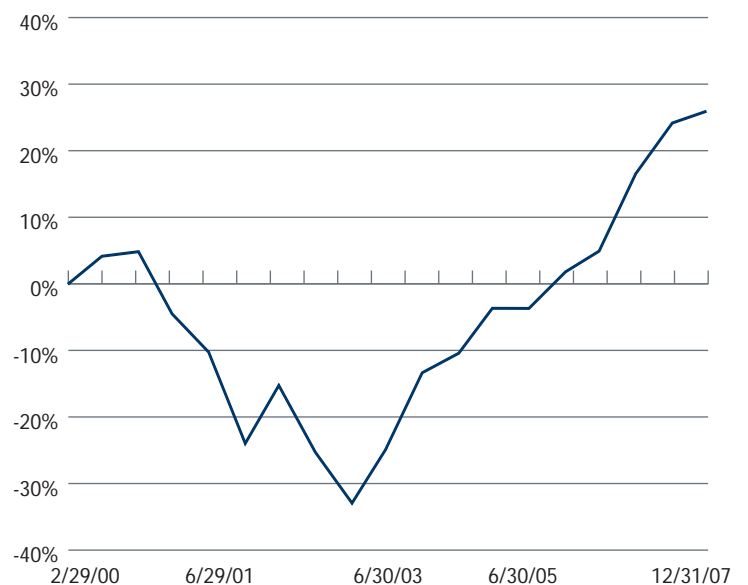
1990-92 Credit Crunch*

The worst bank industry troubles since the 1930s
Annualized price return of 14.50% from 5/31/90 – 5/31/00



2000-02 Tech Bust*

The worst bear market since the great depression
Annualized total return of 2.98% from 2/29/00 – 12/31/07
